# Why does WMO need a RM Strategy?




Resource Mobilization supports the implementation of the WMO vision and long-term goals

DPO will lead the mobilization of **voluntary contributions** and **partnerships** for **technical assistance** and **capacity development** and effectively leverage them, in cooperation with stakeholders, to help WMO Members better provide weather, climate, water and related environmental services that allow people, property and livelihoods to stay safe and thrive.



# Why does WMO need a RM Strategy?



Incoming extrabudgetary funding needs to be managed strategically

### **Strategic Objectives for RM**



#### INCREASE



**Extrabudgetary projects and activities**, including technical assistance, capacity development, development projects, research-innovation based activities, and **WMO global programs** requiring resources beyond regular budget

#### **STRENGHTEN**

**WMO flagship initiatives**, where most of the investment and implementation will be delivered outside the WMO Secretariat - **EW4AII**, **G3W and GBON** 

#### **ENHANCE**



**Broader support to Members**, including supporting development partners to deliver technically appropriate needs-based investments and assisting Members to directly mobilize resources

Whole-of-institution support to Members Promotion of global public good & research advances


# **Context | WMO Funding Structure**

#### **REGULAR BUDGET**

74% of all funding received during the period 2014–2023 was from assessed contributions to support core budget activities

#### WMO annual assessed contributions

*Voluntary contributions & total budget for 2014–2023* 



#### **VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS**



Over the past 10 years, WMO annual voluntary contributions increased, growing from under CHF 15 million in 2014 to over CHF 35 million in 2023

28% increase in Multilateral Climate Funds contributions over the past five years
38% of total between 2019-2023

Voluntary contributions represent **26%** of the total WMO funding

Effective Resource Mobilization

In the WMO context, resource mobilization, partnerships and project management are **intricately linked** 

**Stakeholders, needs, opportunities and available mechanisms** must therefore be considered for every contribution, partnership and project

WMO is a United Nations **specialized technical agency** 

Technical assistance & capacity development projects to support Members

**WMO** Realities

WMO structure **not suitable** for large-scale development investments

Other **Development Partners specialized** in larger investments



### **Resource Mobilization Goals (2/2)**



### Assumptions

#### **Assumption 1**

The WMO Strategic Plan will continue to guide the direction of the organization



#### **Assumption 2**

Members will continue to provide roughly the same volume of assessed contributions (as per Cg-19 decisions)

### Assumption 4

Many traditional donors (members of OECD DAC) will continue to find multi-donor/partner funds (such as CREWS & SOFF) more attractive than bilateral contributions

#### Assumption 3

The bilateral budgets of traditional donors (members of OECD DAC) for weather, climate and water services may not grow significantly

#### **Assumption 5**

Multilateral climate funds will continue to grow as part of the international financial structure funding for WMO priorities


